Dear Presenter,

Personalize: If you have a personal experience that you think will add strength to the appeal, please share it. People connect with others through stories.

Present with Passion: A presentation can have all the above elements, but without passion, it may not stir the hearts of the hearers. Ask God to fill your heart with His Spirit so that you can present the appeal with spirit and truth.

May God richly bless you and speak through you as we take this journey together in 2025.

Religious Liberty

And so, in the very first issue of *Liberty* magazine, which rolled off the presses in 1906, the editor described this unique Adventist understanding of religious liberty. He wrote: "We believe no power but the power of love can rightfully compel the human conscience."

Today, almost 120 years later, the culture around us has changed dramatically. But our commitment to religious liberty as a reflection of God's character hasn't changed.

As students of prophecy, we know that a time will come when our freedom to worship will be taken away. But until then, God calls us be His ambassadors of liberty—to faithfully reflect His character and His love within our communities and our nation.

Today, let's continue in the footsteps of our early Adventist pioneers in generously supporting the religious liberty ministries of our church.

February 8, 2025 Adventist Television Ministries Evangelism

In 1 Corinthians 9:22 Paul says, "I have become all things to all people so that by all possible means I might save some" (NIV). November 5, 1914). If she was alive today, Mrs. White would point to TV as the mighty factor in preaching the three angels' message.

When Joseph Leek died, he left nearly \$1.8 million to an organization that provided guide dogs for the blind. Nothing unusual there. Except that nobody, not even his own family, had any idea that he had that kind of money. The 90-year-old lived like a pauper, according to his daughters. He watched television at a neighbor's house to save on electricity, put off home repairs, and bought secondhand clothes. Joseph's problem was not the lack of money; he was driven to save money to help others.

Likewise, the lack of funds isn't the real issue in the church, but a lack of understanding in the purpose of giving and why God installed this as part of the redemptive restoration process. When we don't participate in giving, it weakens our spirituality and the spirit of generosity.

By giving regularly, we nurture a generous spirit which aligns more with Christ's character. Giving offerings shouldn't be motivated by earthly rewards, but by sharing in Christ's eternal glory. Now this is priceless!

The right understanding of giving should propel us to give more for His glory. That's why our donations to the church should not be driven by emotional appeals and feelings, but by our love and deep commitment to Christ and the people He gave His life for.

Several years ago, I was studying the subject of motivation and motivational factors that drive people. Some people will use reward or threat to get people to respond such as receiving a paycheck or getting fired. Others use fear and guilt. They create fear of losing something if they don't act. Some are motivated by statistical measures and defined goals that provide them with a clear benchmark to strive towards. However, I discovered that all these are low-level motivators and only short term.

In the spiritual world, the same principles apply when it comes to giving tithes and offerings. The highest motivation should be our love for Christ in response to His love for us! This stems from a deep, personal connection and commitment that far outweighs any other incentives.

"We belong to God; we are His sons and daughters—His by creation, and His by the gift of His only-begotten Son for our redemption. 'Ye are not your own; for ye are bought with a price: therefore, glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's" (*Counsels on Stewardship*, p.72).

We give our offerings not to pay for His sacrifice. It wouldn't even come close, but to show our love for Him.

Adventist World Radio

Adventist World Radio (AWR) uses many forms of technology to reach people where they are, in their local dialect. From AWR's shortwave towers in Guam to 2,000 radio stations around the world, these messages are broadcasting in more than 130 languages every day. And for those who aren't in range of a radio station, AWR's YouTube videos, ministry app, and tracts are ministering to millions.

In addition, solar-powered Godpods are reaching everyone from prisoners to shepherds! And the ministry's semi-truck in Ukraine is both meeting needs in the community and broadcasting Biblebased messages of hope wherever it goes.

In 2023 and 2024, the ministry joined with the General Conference's "Total Member Involvement" initiative to hold more than 1,500 meetings across 40+ countries during *Christ for Europe*. From the UK to Italy to Ukraine, people made decisions for baptism. Shortly after these events, meetings in Zambia, Rwanda and Papua New Guinea saw record crowds and baptisms.

God predicted that one day we would be "utterly amazed" (Habakkuk 1:5, NIV) at what He would do—and we are!

Our gold and silver, our most precious earthly possessions, our highest mental and spiritual endowments, will be freely devoted to Him who loved us, and gave Himself for us." (*Desire of Ages*, p.65)

When God liberated the Israelites from Egypt, He instructed them to dedicate a tithe of their belongings to the sanctuary's service. This was a distinct contribution designated for a specific purpose.

The tithe was reserved for supporting those who served in the sanctuary. It was to be collected from the increase of all growth, and together with gifts and offerings, it furnished resources to sustain the gospel's ministry at that time.

After watching these videos, the entire family decided to get baptized.

This wasn't an isolated incident. AWR's radio station in Nazareth has started broadcasting programs in Israel, the West Bank, Palestine and beyond, and hundreds have been contacting the station and studying the Bible as a result.

Last year, in Europe, 1,530 churches across 38 European countries participated in AWR and Total Member Involvement's *Christ for Europe* initiative. We can learn a few lessons from nature: Like humans, ants exhibit social behavior, thriving in meticulously structured societies known as colonies. Remarkably, the unity within these ant colonies is so profound that they collectively work towards the shared goals of survival, growth, and reproduction, functioning much like a unified entity or a "superorganism." Worker ants often use teamwork to move larger objects, coordinating their movements to ensure successful transportation. For instance, leafcutter ants carry leaves and other vegetation that can weigh up to 50 times their body weight. This is equivalent to a human lifting about 7,850 pounds!

Once a month, a Sabbath is set aside for Conference Advance offering. This is used for local evangelism to finance programs most local churches cannot shoulder on their own. We must learn to "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and do not lean on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge Him, and He will make your paths straight" (Proverbs 3:5-6, NKJV). This reliance on God is achieved when we place our complete trust in Him, rather than depending on our own wisdom.

Have you ever rented a church building instead of owning? It's quite common so chances are you understand the complexities of renting shared space. You may or may not have your own designated space so everything probably has to get setup Sabbath morning and then taken down and put away after service is over. Sabbath School rooms for children cannot be decorated because you can't leave anything out. Maybe your host church doesn't allow you to have a fellowship meal or if you can there are strict rules for using the kitchen.

All around, renting is a good option for startup churches, but we'd all prefer it to be temporary. Buying or building a church is the goal for most groups that rent. Do you know the conference will help with funds to buy or build a new church? They do, but where do they get that money from? Tithe cannot be used for purchasing, building or maintaining a church building according to Biblical principles.

There is a small percentage of the Conference Ministries Budget (formerly known as Minnesota Advance) that is designated for church buildings. This is how the conference helps your church or your sister church that rents to be able to own a building. It can take several years to save enough funds just to help one church buy or build.

As you see the need around you, please give to Conference Ministries Budget to support congregations who need their own building.

Annual Sacrifice for Global Mission

In 1857 David Livingstone was invited to receive a tribute and speak to students at Cambridge University in England. In my younger years, my fascination with mathematics, particularly with the concept of multiplication, was immense. I was especially excited learning the principles of multiplication because it was one of the fastest ways to reach a higher total. Multiplication is a mathematical process that adds a number to itself repeatedly a specific number of times.

This mathematical principle later found an analogy in my spiritual journey. I realized that the growth of God's kingdom often resonates better with multiplication than addition. For example, it is better to have five people each doing one ministry and teaching others to do the same, rather than for one person doing five ministries by himself. This is the essence of "disciplers" — disciples who train other disciples.

Another way to step into the realm of such multiplication is through generous offerings to God. When we present our offerings to God, He multiplies them, extending the blessings to many. We need not dwell on the mathematics of our giving or attempt to rationalize the outcomes. Merely giving in faith is sufficient.

Reflect on the promise, "He will reward honest, simple reliance upon Him. The little that is wisely and economically used in the service of the Lord of heaven will increase in the very act of imparting" (*Desire of Ages*, p. 371).
